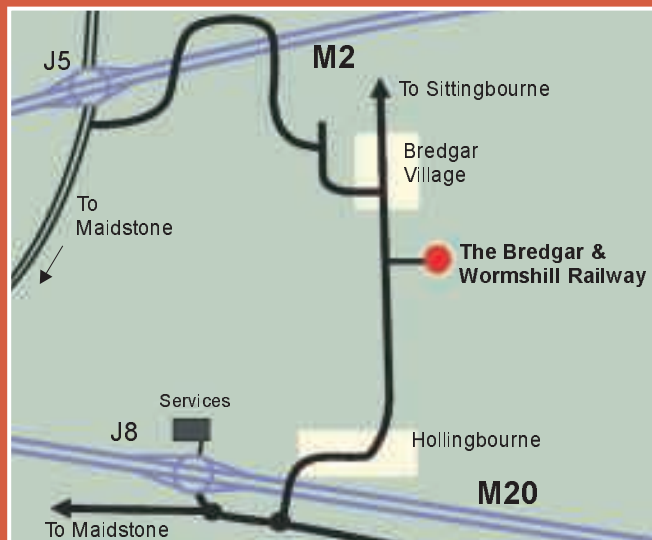


How to find us



The Railway is conveniently situated about midway between Sittingbourne and Hollingbourne.

Drivers approaching via the M20 should leave the motorway at junction 8 and follow the signs for Lenham. At the second roundabout turn left through Hollingbourne and continue on this road for three miles. The entrance to the Railway is on your right just before the village of Bredgar.

Drivers approaching via the M2 should leave the motorway at junction 5 and take the A249 towards Maidstone. After about 200 yards turn left - signposted Bredgar. On arrival in Bredgar village turn right towards Hollingbourne. The entrance to the railway is about a mile beyond the village of on your left.

Please note there are no public transport services that pass the railway. Taxis are available from Sittingbourne Station.

Opening Times

The Bredgar & Wormshill Light Railway is open to the public on Easter Sunday and then on the first Sunday of each month from May to October inclusive.

The large free car park opens at 10.00am. The first train departs at 11.00am and thence about every 12 minutes until 4.30pm.

Located amidst Kent's beautiful North Downs, the Bredgar and Wormshill Railway is a very different kind of day out for all the family.

The centrepiece is a delightful narrow gauge railway where restored steam locomotives from around the world haul comfortable carriages built in the railway's own workshops. Those locomotives not in service or undergoing restoration can be seen in the main museum building alongside the Railway's collection of vintage road vehicles. Also resident at the railway are two traction engines and a steam roller which are normally in action on open days.

The tea rooms adjacent to Warren Wood Station sells hot and cold drinks, rolls and a delicious selection of home-made cakes. For those who like to bring their own food there are over 20 acres of woodland and parkland suitable for picnicking, and also superb

woodland walks.

Another popular attraction is the newly extended model railway, with lots of operating features - including a cave dwelling dragon! Other exhibits include an operating beam engine that once pumped water to the town of Ashford in Kent, miniature railway engines, a vintage bus and a Dutch Street Organ.

The price of admission includes car parking, unlimited rides on the woodland railway and entrance to the museum building.

Although normally open to the public for only seven days a year, the Railway is happy to accept bookings from schools or groups at any time. Also available are the popular 'steam driving experience days' and occasional special events outside of the normal programme.
